

A Solid First Season

When Hoosick Falls beat Hornell 34-21 in the New York State Class C championship game, it ended the second-longest win streak in state history. Hornell had a 51-game win streak snapped - a stretch that covered the past 4 years.

Hoosick Falls fell behind 7-0 in the first quarter but dominated the rest of the way.

It was the first career loss for first-year head coach Erik Werner - who was also a big part of the winning streak.

Even with the loss, for Werner, coaching in the Carrier Dome for the NYS title was a dream come true.

"I always wanted to be a high school coach," Werner said, "ever since the 4th grade I knew what I wanted to be. You grow up with Pennsylvania football and it sticks."

Werner played football at Warren Area High School in the western part of Pennsylvania, just across the border from Jamestown, NY. He started at C and LB.

"I was just a normal varsity starter," he said. "Nothing special."

He was good enough to play college football at Alfred University, first playing C before moving to TE. He would move back to C before his career was over. HORNEL FOOTBALL

Erik Werner led Hornell to the NYS championship game and a 12-1 record this season. It was Werner's first season after taking over for the legendary Gene Mastin.

He served as a volunteer assistant at Alfred and then was hired as a Math teacher at Hornell.

During his first year as a teacher, he had a chance meeting with legendary Hornell coach Gene Mastin that led Werner to the Hornell coaching staff.

"I bumped into Gene in the teachers lounge," Werner said. "Which is kind of funny because neither one of us ever went in there. But, for whatever reason, on this day I went in to get a soda, he was in there to get a cup of coffee. We had a 5-minute staff meeting."

Erik Werner has been a part of Hornell football ever since. He started his career as a varsity assistant in 2003 and spent 3 years with Mastin.

"I coached the defensive line, the offensive line and the

head coach some day."

"We had a couple losses each year," Werner said. "We always wanted to win but my role was to make sure that the kids that the varsity was getting were fundamentally sound and ready to go."

After two seasons, he re-joined the varsity staff as the defensive coordinator under Mastin - a job that Werner held for 4 seasons.

At this point, Mastin began planning his retirement from coaching... and began grooming Werner to take his place.

"We had conversations years before he retired," Werner said. "In 2009 we started talking about the future. He

knew exactly when he was going to go out."

Mastin retired after the 2011 season with three straight state titles and a 39-game win streak intact. He left with 240 wins, a figure that places him 14th on New York State's all-time list.

Mastin planned everything down to the last detail - his own retirement would be no different.

"He was very organized, methodical and cerebral," Werner said. "He did everything you could possibly think of to make it smooth for me. He left the right way. He left us with a lot of talent in the cupboard. He left with a great

coaching staff in place and kids that knew how to go about things in the right way."

With everything in place, there was no longer a reason for Mastin to stay.

"He accomplished what he wanted to accomplish and retired," Werner said. "I think three consecutive state championships is a pretty good way to go out."

Werner took control of the program and the Raiders

won 12 straight games to push the streak to 51 just four wins behind the state-record 55-game win streak that the 1957 Massena team had posted in Section 10. Also, Riverdale (NYC) had a 51game unbeaten streak (49-0-2) end in 1966.

What's impressive about Hornell's streak is that the Red Raiders had to do something that, years ago, teams never had to do... beat competition from across the state.

Until the early 1980s, most teams played 8 games and ended the season. League champions were named after the season.

Hornell has been facing the best the state has to offer for the past 5 vears - and the Raiders have posted a record of 60-2 over those seasons.

In fact. Werner had only experienced one loss as a coordinator with Mastin.

In 2008. Hornell suffered a terrible tragedy when Dillen McCormick, a popular senior on the

team shot and killed himself the week of the Section 5 championship game.

"His younger brother was a JV call-up that year," Werner said. "He was up practicing with us that week when it happened. That was a real difficult week for our team and our whole community."

Werner says that there were never any warning signs of depression and McCormick left no note.

"It caught everyone by surprise," Werner said. "You never know what is going on in the head of a 17-year-old kid but I didn't know of any reason to suspect this was coming. It was a shock for everyone."

In a small city like Hornell, everyone would be affected.

"Dillen's uncle is my defensive coordinator," Werner said. "He was a great kid and everyone liked him. I had him as a junior in one of my classes."

Trying to prepare for a game would have been difficult... trying to prepare for a Section 5 title game was almost impossible.

"We were going up against a superior team in Geneva,"

Werner said, "We wanted to do our best and honor Dillen by playing the best we could. We really had to lean on each other just to get through the week."

Geneva won the game and went on to win the NYS title.

Mastin was never beaten again, making an impossible act for Werner to follow.

"I would have been nervous going into any job but Hornell was different," Werner said. "We were on a 39-game winning streak and had won three New York State titles. Anything less than that was going to be a disappointment."

With the clock ticking away in the 4th quarter in the Carrier Dome, it became evident that Hoosick Falls was in control and that the Hornell streak was coming to an end.

"It was difficult," Werner said. "A loss is always difficult but a loss in a championship game is very difficult. We thought we could win."



Still... a 12-1 finish was an incredible season.

"Our kids were upset but it was a great season," Werner said. "I was so proud of those kids. They played to the last play. It was an amazing ride that we were on and it was a great senior class. I'm sad to see them go but they gave the younger guys a blueprint for success. They know what we have to do to win."

Werner also knows, thanks to Mastin.

"Gene built such a great program," Werner said. "Not just winning but playing great football with good sportsmanship and class. That's how I want to run things."



On A Crusade

Rich Robbins leads Canisius to a historic 11-0 season

With all of the focus on the recent NYS playoffs in Syracuse, one team in Western New York State slipped quietly into the top spot in the final Class AA poll.

Canisius (Msgr. Martin Association in Buffalo) ended the year ranked #1 in New York State in Class AA.

"It's been unbelievable what we have been able to accomplish this season," Canisius coach Rich Robbins said. "All the accolades of the kids and the staff have just been unbelievable."

Robbins led his Canisius team to a 28-20 win over Bishop Timon in Ralph Wilson Stadium to win the Msgr. Martin Association championship and finish a perfect 11-0 season.

After the season, Robbins - in just his second season as a head coach, was named the WNY Coach of the Year by the Buffalo Bills.

"Obviously I'm honored and humbled that they chose me," Robbins said. "Obviously, it's an award that is about much more than just me. I have

the best assistant coaches in Western New York and some great, great kids at Canisius to coach."

Also, running back Qadree Ollison rushed for 1,060 yards and was named the WNY Player of the Year by the Upstate Football Weekly. Ollison and OL Ryan Hunter were named Co-Players of the Year by The Buffalo News.

But, while it all seemed to come together for the Crusaders this year, Robbins actually had a difficult start to his head coaching career. When he was named as the head coach after Brandon Harris had left, the Canisius program was going through a difficult period.

"Brandon was a great coach," Robbins said, "but there was some difficult things going on behind the scenes. It took some work to repair those relationships."

The other complicating factor was timing. Harris left Canisius in February and Robbins was not named the program's head coach until June.

"Coach Harris had been gone for a few months," he said, "and there was a period of time where we had no coach. The kids were really on their own. We only had 5 or 6 kids in the weight room that spring."

Robbins' first year on the Canisius sideline was a disappointment as the Crusaders finished 4-7.

"We had 27 guys on the varsity team," Robbins said. "I had to get kids to want to play football for Canisius again."

Robbins says that he never lost faith that the program would flourish quickly.

"We were a young team," Robbins said, "but we knew we had a special group of kids that does not come around every season. I knew we were going to win games."

Robbins also began a "talking tour" with anyone who would listen.

"I had more than a few meetings with anyone that

was interested in talking about football," Robbins said. "It wasn't even about the team. Just anyone who was interested in Canisius football on any level, just to give everyone a chance to get to know me."

The marketing campaign worked.

"We had 55 kids on the varsity this year," Robbins said. "We also have four guys on staff that are also teachers in the school. We all work at the school full time. That allows us to have that football family within the school. We see the players every day. We know if they are doing their homework and how they are doing on their tests."

Robbins grew up in the football-rich area of Western

Pennsylvania but would never have quessed that he would some day end up coaching one of the top Catholic teams in New York State .

"I'm a public school kid from Pittsburgh," Robbins said. "I was a lineman for North Allegany High School."

Robbins played college football at Alfred University under coach Jim Moretti. After graduating from college with a degree in Business, he entered the workforce.

"I was a sales guy for DHL," he said. "I was selling shipping and logistic services."

Robbins was paid a decent salary but his work did not come close to filling his competitive drive.

"It was boiler room sales," Robbins said. "I had to make a 100 phone calls and see 20 customers every week. Pretty boring stuff."

Robbins got his football fix by joining the Flag Football League in Western New York. He was a teammate of Canisius assistant coach Bryan Gorman.

"He saw how I was helping other guys in flag football," Robbins said, "and he asked me if I ever thought about going into coaching. That sounded really fun, so I came down and volunteered

for the Canisius staff. I just fell in love with the school and the program."

He coached for 4 seasons at Canisius while also working his sales job for DHL.

"That was tough," he said. "I knew I needed to go back and get my Master's Degree in Education if I was going to do the coaching. I went back to Canisius College and got my Master's in 2011."

He earned his

Master's Degree and was hired as a full-time employee at Canisius High School just a few short months after Harris left the Jesuit school.

In fact, 2011 was a year of huge

change for Robbins.

"I got hired as a head coach, got hired as a teacher and got hired as an assistant dean of students all in 2011."

he said, "and that was my first time doing all three of those jobs. Hopefully, I'm a little better at all 3 jobs now than I was a year ago."

The Canisius football program is certainly in a better position than it was just a year ago. The Crusaders accomplished big things this season.

The last Msgr. Martin Association team to finish a season unbeaten was St. Joe's in 1998. The last Canisius team to finish unbeaten was the 1976 squad that finished 7-0-1.

It was the first

Msgr. Martin championship for Canisius since the Crusaders won the title in

2009, under Harris.

Canisius also showcased two of the top players in the state this season.

Junior RB Qadree Ollison rushed for 1,976 yards and 27 TDs on 202 carries. He scored 26 TDs rushing. He also caught 9 passes for 116 yards.

Ollison scored a school-record 156 points this season and also set the school's single-season rushing record.

"I've seen a lot of football and watched some of the Sectional games," Robbins said. "I absolutely think he is


one of the top 5 players in the state as a junior. With all his work that he is doing, I expect him to have a special season as a senior."

Also, senior lineman Ryan Hunter proved himself to be one of the state's top college prospects.

Hunter, a native of North Bay, Ontario

in Canada, is 6-5 and weighs 320 pounds. Before the season started, he verbally committed to play at Bowling Green State University

the key to Canisius football becoming physical," Robbins said. "We outscored some people the last few years but this year was different. Our defense was different, our practices were different. We would

trade punches with people. We were a physical team and Ryan led the charge on that."

Hunter did not allow a QB sack all season and was given the Trench Trophy as the top offensive lineman in Western New York. A few weeks later, the Buffalo Bills Alumni Association gave Hunter the Tom Day-Tom Sestak Award as the top defensive lineman in WNY.

Despite his enormous size, Hunter is also an outstanding athlete.

"He has a hockey and basketball in his background," Robbins said. "He is a hell of a basketball player. He's good at badminton or Tiddlywinks. Whatever sport it is, he can pick it up and do it."

Robbins also says that he has the utmost respect for any of the players in his program.

"With what these kids are required to do academically and athletically," he said, "each and every one of them deserves my full respect."

Robbins says that his players are already talking about another perfect season in 2013.

"We have a ton of talent coming back." he said. "and we have already talked about 22-0. We want to keep it rolling and go undefeated again."



Casali Leaves with Hansen

Sachem Senior follows coach's footsteps with Suffolk's Top Honor

Sachem East senior Steven Casali was named the 63rd annual winner of the Hansen Award, presented to the top football player in Suffolk County (Section 11).

During his acceptance speech of the Award, Casali said he had dreamed of that moment since his fresh-

man year at Sachem East.

Even though that Sachem team was 0-7, Casali had dreams of being great. His dreams came true fivefold as he collected more individual honors than any player in the history of the Suffolk County Football Coaches Association awards dinner in early December at the Hyatt in Hauppauge, N.Y.

Aside from being named the Hansen winner, Casali was also named the Bob Collotta Award winner as the top linebacker, the Joe Cipp Jr. Award winner as the top running back, the Rob Burnett Long Island Defensive Player of the Year, the Suffolk County Division I MVP and collected his plaque as co-MVP of the Suffolk County Division I championship game.

Casali also learned he was one of 10 Suffolk County players to be named First Team

All-Long Island. It was a monumental evening for Sachem East football and the Casali family.

"My parents taught me hard work at an early age and I think that paid off right now," said Casali, who set almost every offensive and defensive record at Sachem East in his career. "I'm blessed to even play football.

Being a Sachem football player means the world to me. I'm going to miss it. I'm proud to say I was part of this team and I couldn't do it without my teammates and my coaches."

To be precise about Casali's school records, there

are 18. Among the most impressive are total career offensive vards (3,697), singleseason total yards (1,938), career rushing yards (3,651), singleseason rushing yards (1,915), career touchdowns (41), singleseason touchdowns (20), career points (250), career tackles (220), single-season tackles (104), and single-game tackles (17).

> named the Hansen winner in 1985. Wojciechowski, a 6-1, 240-pound senior, played tackle on offense and nose guard on defense. A panel of coaches and officials selected him from a list of 17 candidates and named him the top player in Suffolk County.

Wojciechowski has had quite a year.

In April of last year, his family's home burned down. The five people who live at the house - Wojciechowski,

his wife, two daughters and a nephew - all escaped unharmed. The Wojciechowskis' dog was also saved.

Wojciechowskis house, the only home he had ever lived in, was destroyed. Only a few pictures and incredibly - the Hansen Award he won as a player were recovered.

At the banquet, Woj, as he is affectionately known around Long Island, was emotional.

"You're not going to come across many like him in your life," Woj said. "He's a

special kid. He's 10 times a better football player than I ever was. I hope kids in our program look up to him. He's carried himself in such a way that he's a great role model for all our kids."

Casali who will play linebacker at the University of Massachusetts just like Wojciechowski did, is the definition of an old school Sachem football player. No matter if it was practice or a game, his jersey would be ripped and you knew he made a difference in the contest at first glance. Then you could take a look at the score sheet and see the real story. In 2012, Casali rushed for 1.915 yards and 20 touchdowns, and made 104 tackles this year, all single-season records.

Almost every time Casali touched the field he had a memorable game and monstrous numbers on both sides of the ball. Midway through the regular season he put together a valiant effort in a 25-17 win on the road at Longwood, rushing for 289 yards and three touchdowns, along with 14 tackles and three forced fumbles.

During Sachem East's playoff stretch, he rushed for more than 700 yards, including a 273-yard, 4-TD effort against William Floyd in the Suffolk County Division I

championship. When it mattered most, Casali always played his best football.

Asked what the favorite moment of his career has

been, he said witnessing the touchdown catch made by teammate Ryan Dippel on a pass from quarterback Danny Wolff during the county semifinals at Connetquot that gave East a 33-28 victory as time expired.

In a two-year stretch of success, that game was the most exciting on-field moment in the program's nineseason history.

Casali, who finished with a career-high 44 carries, 237 vards and two touchdowns in the win, scored a

> touchdown with 56 seconds left but failed to convert on the two-point conversion. East trailed, 28-27.

> On the next play the Arrows recovered the onsidekick giving Sachem East the ball and one last chance. On that special teams play, Casali led the blocking charge and opened the hole for receiver Brian Balsamo to recover the kick.

Finally on third-and-nine, Wolff hit Dippel with the game-winning TD as time expired.

Casali said, when the program was down, before Woj had taken over, that he was embarrassed to walk around with his Sachem shirts and jackets. But that game changed everyone associated with the program.

Casali now understands the importance of wearing clothes with the name "Sachem" acorss the front.

"When Ryan Dippel caught that ball I was never happier to wear Sachem across my chest," Casali said. "I will remember that for the rest of my life. It was an amazing experience."

His teammates and coaches will forever say the same thing about watching him play.

Good As Gold

Lawrence QB sets several records for Golden Tornadoes

In 2011, sophomore Joe Capobianco made headlines across the state as the Lawrence QB took part in the highest scoring shootout in New York State history.

Capobianco and his Golden Tornadoes lost the Class III Long Island championship game to Sayville and QB Steven Ferreira in a wild 78-61 shootout.

Capobianco was spectacular in that loss as he completed 27 of 41 passes for 541 yards and 7 touchdowns, all Long Island championship records.

However, he walked away unsatisfied and ready to embark on another two years of varsity football.

Lawrence and Sayville met again in the 2012 title game however, Ferreira had graduated.

With many predicting another shootout, the game was largely a defensive battle as the teams battled the cold at Hofstra University.

Capobianco wasn't as spectacular this time but still had another solid game as he completed 18 of 24 passes for 209 yards and 1 TD.

With Lawrence traiing 21-7 to start the 2nd half, Capobianco led the Tornadoes downfield on the opening drive and scored a TD on a 5-yard run to close the gap to 20-14.

"I kept preaching we're not losing this game,"

Lawrence's Eddie Robinson made the key play of the game when he returned an interception 30 yards to put Lawrence ahead for good at 21-20.

By season's end, Capobianco set the Long Island single-season record with 38 touchdown passes, and also passed for 2,609 yards. He completed 80 percent of his passes with only three interceptions, leading Lawrence to a Long Island-record 581 points in 2012.

With Capobianco leading the offense, the Tornadoes

finished 12-0 and scored at least 50 points in a game six times this past season Lawrence scored 60 points twice.

Lawrence also scored at least 34 points in every game until winning the title game 21-20.

The Tornadoes were rewarded when they were ranked #1 in NYS in Class A at the end pf the season, an honor they shared with NYS champion Burnt Hills.

With 67 TD passes through two seasons, Capobianco is only 6 away from snapping Ferreira's Long Island career record of 73 that the Savville QB set in 2011.

"He is the best quarterback we've ever had at Lawrence," said Golden Tornadoes head coach Joe Martillotti. "He developed on his own and put the time in."

As a freshman, Capobianco played on the junior varsity squad

since Martillotti had Syracuse-bound John Kinder as his starter. Kinder would be named the 2009 Class A New York State Player of the Year.

Martillotti had made a big switch before the 2006 See Capobianco on page 14



season.

Dating back to the 1920s, when Olympic Gold Medalist Ray Barbuti ran out of the backfield, Lawrence had always been known for star tailbacks and a strong running game.

In 2006, Martillotti switched to a spread offense to take advantage of the handful of talented threats they had in the program.

"We're pretty diverse in what we do with it because of the talent," said Martillotti. "Then you throw a kid in like Joe, the fact he can throw the ball vertical makes it dangerous. There wasn't a throw on the field that I didn't think he could make."

Capobianco knows he and his teammates all reap the benefits of the spread andthat he can give the ball to a number of different players at any given time.

Robinson, who made the biggest interception of the year in the title game victory over Sayville, also caught a Long Island-record 19 TD passes last season. Running backs Tyler and Jordan Fredericks also provided solid targets in the spread offense.

"If I want to throw the ball up on third-and-ten to any of those guys," Capobianco said, "I know they'll come down with a catch and get the yards."

It helps that Capobianco spent his childhood using the spread offense with the same teammates. As an 11-year-old playing for the Inwood Buccaneers (coached by Lawrence alum and former New York Jets RB Vaughn Sanders), Capobianco learned the basics of the Spread Offense that he would use for the next seven years.

In a career filled with big touchdowns, long passes and memorable plays, Martillotti said it's not a pass play that he has bookmarked as his favorite Capobianco moment... it's a reception.


Against Bethpage High School during the 2012 season, Capobianco lined up as a receiver with Robinson moving under center. Noticing no one was covering him, he called for the ball and caught a 30-yard touchdown pass. On the following play Capobianco converted a 2-point PAT by running out of the wildcat formation.

No matter if throwing or catching the ball Capobianco's field vision is always second to none when he's on the field.

"He makes a living off backside routes, check downs and hot routes," Martillotti said. "You can watch him scan the field and it's something pretty special that he does."

Capobianco is one of the top QB rtalents in the state, according to Martillotti.

"He looks like a college kid playing the quarterback position with high school kids," he said. "The fact we have him another year is great for the program."


