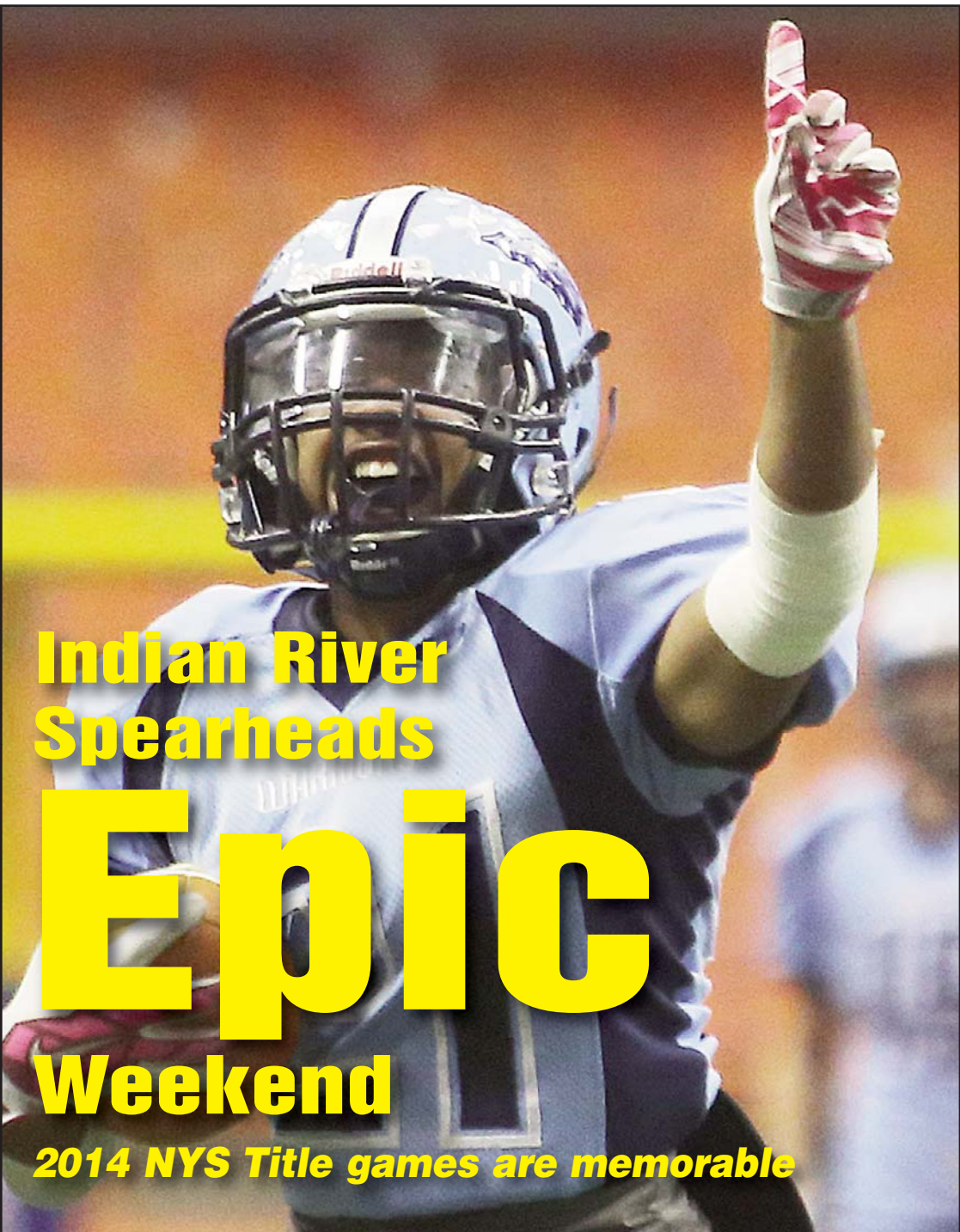

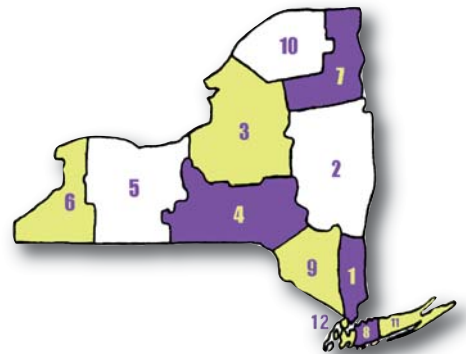

Canisius Finishes Ranked #1

Canisius was named the top team in New York State in the final Class AA poll after winning the state's first NYS Catholic Championship last weekend with a 23-10 win over Archbishop Stepinac.

"It was a long month with a lot of distractions and adversity," Canisius coach Rich Robbins said. "I was so proud of this group because we never lost focus. Everything that happened made these kids made these kids tighter as a family. They made a commitment to go and win the state title and that's what they did."

The Crusaders had to overcome quite a few obstacles on their way to the title.

They faced Stepinac while missing a pair of 2-way starters. Brad Zaffram (FB and MLB) and James Thomas (LT and OLB) both missed the game due to suspensions.

Zaffram's suspension was for a violation of school rules and made huge news and caused quite a bit of controversy in Buffalo. He missed all three of the Crusaders playoff games. Thomas was ejected for throwing a punch in the Crusaders league-title game against Bishop Timon - a fact that Canisius bitterly disputed. Game films appeared to show that no punch was thrown.

Michael Tarbutt kicked three FGs, including an epic 60-yarder in the first quarter, and was named the game's Offensive MVP.

"It's not many times that the offensive MVP of a state championship game is your kicker," Robbins said. "Michael has a very strong leg. I've seen him make several 60 yarders in practice. He had a 10 MPH wind behind him and I was confident that he could make it."

Canisius trailed 10-6 at the start of the 4th quarter.

"We had not been doing well on offense," Robbins said, "and we were worried a bit. But the kids responded."

Quarterback Jake Loucks scored on an 18-yard keeper to give Canisius a 13-10 lead. Tarbutt kicked his 3rd FG and Canisius led 16-10 with just six minutes to play.

Stepinac made a bid to win the game late as QB Brandon Coleman broke free for a 50-yard run. Mitch Thomas caught him from behind and tackled Coleman at the 20-yard line.

"Mitch saved the day for us," Robbins said. "Even though he plays RB and was tired, he hustled down the field and ran the kid down."

After a pair of QB sacks, Jerome Brundidge intercepted a pass and returned it 71 yards for the game-clinching TD with a minute left.

It was the Crusaders 5th interception of the day.

"Stepinac averaged 40 points per game this season," Robbins said, "and they have a number of Division I players. We had 5 interceptions and held them to under 200 yards so I was really proud of our defensive coaches and players."

An Epic Weekend

The NYSPHSAA has been staging season-ending NYS championships in football since 1993. The 2014 season ended with one of the most epic weekends ever at the Carrier Dome.

All five games carried intriguing story lines and there seemed to be something for every fan that bought a ticket.

There were epic games, epic comebacks, epic rallies, epic individual performances.

Maine-Endwell won the Class B title and became the first team to win four consecutive NYS titles. The Spartans have won 51 games - tied for the longest streak in NY State history and currently the 3rd-longest winning streak in the nation.

"Honestly, I have never heard one player say, we can't lose because of the streak," Spartans' coach Matt Gallagher said. "No one has ever said that. There has never been any extra pressure because of the streak. We feel like we need to win because we don't like to lose. That's it."

Gallagher also admits that it's hard to come to terms with what his program is accomplishing right now.

"When people start throwing out the word 'history' you take a step back," he said. "But when you are the middle of something like this, it's hard to appreciate it as much as we probably should. We hope that streak continues into next year. We had 30 guys in the weight room this week to get ready for next season."

Matt Gallagher also got the joy of having his son Adam named the game's MVP. Adam Gallagher scored a pair of defensive TDs, a 25-yard interception return and a 96-yard fumble return.

"At those times of the game they were very big plays," Matt Gallagher said. "Especially the fumble return. That was huge."

Schalmont had fallen behind 21-0 at the half but had regrouped during the break. The Sabres forced a punt on the first possession of the second half and were driving for a TD that would get them back in the game.

Schalmont reached the Maine-Endwell 4-yard line, but on first and goal, the snap from center was bobbled. Adam Gallagher grabbed the ball out of midair and raced 96 yards for a TD and a 27-0 lead.

"It was just perfect timing," Matt Gallagher said. "If they score there, it might have been a very different ball game."

Adam Gallagher now has his high school football career end without ever having experienced a loss. He will graduate as a 4-time NYS champion and holding a 51-0 record as a high school player.

"Obviously it's pretty special," Matt Gallagher said, "but just watching

the whole team celebrate was great. As a dad, it's pretty special that my boys got a chance to play with such great kids and team mates. To have Adam be named the MVP really put the icing on the cake."

Adam Gallagher was the second of Matt's sons to be named the MVP of a state title game. His oldest son Kyle was named the MVP of the 2012 championship game.

The weekend's first game was truly an epic contest.

Randolph, winner of the last two Class D NYS titles, played Chester at the Dome for the second consecutive

season.

"Last year didn't mean anything to us," Randolph coach Brent Brown said. "We had some films on them from the 2 weeks prior. Their tailback had rushed for 780 yards and 11 TDs in two games. So, of course, we practiced quite a bit to stop the run."

Instead, Chester came out throwing and completely shredded the Randolph defense.

"They came out with an all-out passing attack," Brown said. "They had 3 kids who could catch it, the quarterback could throw and they protected him. That's pretty tough to defend against. That kid was hot and they made some nice plays."

Chester QB Vincent Aloji passed for 254 yards and 2 TDs in the first half alone. Chester built a 14-0 lead and extended it to 27-6 at the half.

"We don't see that kind of passing attack very much," Brown said. "We hadn't seen that in quite a few years."

In fact, no one can remember a Randolph team getting trounced like it was... and it was getting trounced.

In the locker room at the half, Brown simply talked about adjustments his players had to make.

"We were down by 3 scores but we got the ball first," Brown said. "I told the kids that if we score and get a stop, it would be a new ball game."

Randolph pulled to within 27-13 and then got the defensive stop they needed. Suddenly, it was 27-21 and it was indeed a new game - yet it was FAR from over.

"The momentum had changed at that point," Brown said. "You could feel it."

Randolph scored 3 TDs and 21 points in the third quarter to pull ahead 28-27. They extended the lead to 34-27 early in the 4th quarter... and couldn't hold the lead.

"They started throwing the ball again and they beat us," Brown said.

When Chester scored to pull ahead 35-34, there was just 6:33 left in the game.

But Randolph answered and led 40-35.

"All we needed was one more stop," Brown said, "and

we still couldn't get it."

Chester scored one more time to take a 41-40 lead with just a minute to play. Randolph would need a huge play to try and score one final time.

Morrison scrambled and found Derek Young wide open on a 23-yard pass play to the Chester 5-yard line. With just :30 left, Morrison rushed into the end zone for the game-winning TD.

"They didn't have enough time to do anything but deep shots," Brown said.

"Thankfully... I'm not sure we could have stopped them."

In all, the teams combined for 1,087 yards of offense.

The weekend's epic individual performance came from Jamestown's Zach Panebianco as he helped the Red Raiders win the Class AA title with a 41-20 win over Newburgh Free Academy.

"That was a great game," Jamestown coach Tom Langworthy said. "It was well-played by both teams and both teams competed hard. We were the better team over 48 minutes."

But, the individual performance of Zach Panebianco was stunning.

Panebianco caught 6 passes for 125 yards, including a 22-yard TD pass. Several of his catches were acrobatic, including a one-handed circus catch that had the crowd roaring. Panebianco went over the middle but QB Nikk Holland's pass was behind him. Panebianco turned in mid-air, reached back and caught the ball one-handed.

The entire crowd roared. The only people who didn't seem to notice Panebianco's heroics were the Raiders.

"Our offensive tempo is so fast that we don't have any time to think of the last play," Langworthy said. "Also, we're used to seeing Zach doing that kind of stuff. He does it in practice every day."

Panebianco also returned a punt 67 yards to set up a TD drive, nailed a 37-yard punt that went out of bounds on Newburgh's 1-yard line, made a diving catch on a 45-yard pass, and intercepted a pass to end Newburgh's last offensive drive and seal the win.

Panebianco was named the game's MVP.

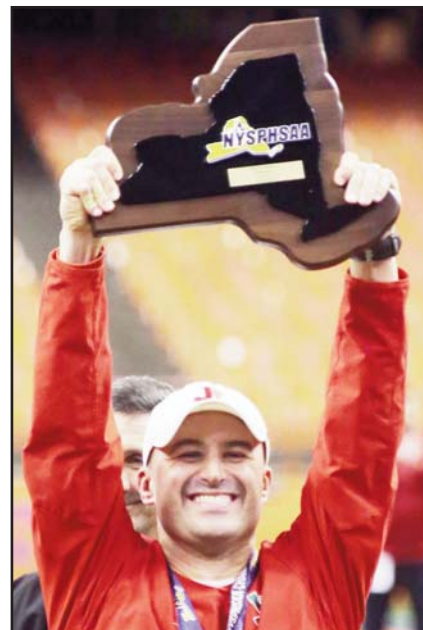

Indian River gets an 'A'

Warriors win school's first NYS title with offensive explosion

In a weekend full of amazing moments, probably the most stunning result of the five games was Indian River's 63-38 win over Queensbury in the Class A final.

Indian River won the school's first NYS title in the most improbable of ways. The Warriors fell behind 13-0 in the first minute of the game and trailed 19-0 late in the first quarter.

Queensbury took the opening kickoff and started with the ball on their own 31-yard line. On the first snap, Tyrell Adams bolted 96 yards to the Indian River 4-yard line. Erik Wettersten punched in a 4-yard TD on the next play. The entire drive took 30 seconds.

After the TD, Queensbury kicked off but Indian River fumbled the return, giving the Spartans the ball on the 26-yard line. Two plays later Brett Rodriguez rumbled in from 9 yards out and a 13-0 lead exactly 1:01 into the game.

The opening blitz unnerved Indian River coach Cory Marsell.

"I was thinking that it could get ugly here real quick," Marsell said. "But our guys seemed focused. It was still very early so we told them to keep playing hard."

Indian River held on to the next kickoff. They moved the ball down to the Queensbury goal line with a chance to get back into the game. Instead, the Warriors lost a fumble at the Queensbury 2-yard line. It took the Spartans just 5 plays to score their 3rd TD of the open-

and jet sweeps. His speed is very good. He's not the fastest guy on the team but his moves are the best. He's hard to catch."

Washington, at 5-feet-4 and 130 pounds, was the smallest player on the field but played a huge role. By the time Indian River stopped piling on points, he had rushed for 196 yards and 2 TDs on just 13 carries. He was also named the Player of the Game.

"He's a quiet kid," Marsell said. "He's a funny kid who loves to play football. He just does his thing out there. He got a lot better as the year went on and he loves the

ing frame. The Spartans had scored three TDs on nine plays.

"Our kids still weren't discouraged," Marsell said. "They thought we could move the ball on them because we already had."

The Warriors finally answered late in the first quarter when Densel Barnes scored on a 4-yard run to pull Indian River within 19-7. The play capped an 8-play, 75-yard drive and seemed to open the floodgates.

After the kickoff, Indian River recovered a fumble on Queensbury's first play from scrimmage and took the ball on the 36-yard line. Three plays gained no yards and ended the quarter. On the first play of the 2nd quarter, on 4th-and-10, Romel Washington ripped off a 36-yard TD run.

"He's quick," Marsell said. "He gets the ball primarily on counters

kick returns.”

Washington was in the Indian River program previously.

“He was here as a freshman and played on the JV team,” Marsell said. “We liked him a lot. He was quick and elusive.”

However, Washington moved out of the Indian River district after the football season.

“He didn’t play with us as a sophomore,” Marsell said. “He came back at the very end of last football season but he didn’t have enough games to join us for the playoffs. He watched us playing in the Section 3 finals.”

Indian River lost that game to Carthage 21-20 and it can only be thought that Washington may have been enough help to get the Warriors into the state tourney.

“He wished he could have helped out at that point,” Marsell said, “but he had just moved back. He ran indoor track for me in the winter. His focus was to get faster so he could start at wing-back for the varsity.”

Fullback Dustin Sharrit ran for 89 yards and 3 TDs.

Marsell was an All-North quarterback and linebacker for Indian River, graduating in 1993. He went on to play at Cortland State.

“It was one of my dreams to play for Cortland,” Marsell said.

“When I went into my senior year of high school it just clicked that I wanted to play for them. I was determined to prove that I was good enough.”

He went to Cortland State and walked on to the team but did not suit up as a freshman.

“I made the team as a fullback the next season,” Marsell said. “I played three years and we beat Ithaca two out of three years.”

Marsell graduated in 1998 with one year of eligibility left but chose not to play his last season.

“I got offered a job as a Phys Ed teacher at Indian River,” he said. “I was also an assistant football coach on the varsity.”

He worked under Jay Brown, who is now the school’s Athletic Director.

“He was my football coach in high school,” Marsell said. “He helped me come back to Indian River and has been a mentor for a long time.”

Marsell was offered the head coaching job in 2006. He has a record of 79-14.

Marsell says he never considered winning the NYS championship.

“To be honest with you, I would have thought that was too lofty of a dream,” he said. “We had never won Section 3. We just wanted to try and win our league and then take care of Section 3.”

Indian River had, in fact, played in the state tournament - but only when the school was playing in Section 10, a section with only two Class A schools.

“Before I got here, the program was down a bit,” Marsell said. “The school thought it would help strengthen the program to play against smaller schools in Section 10. It did exactly what they hoped it would do. By the

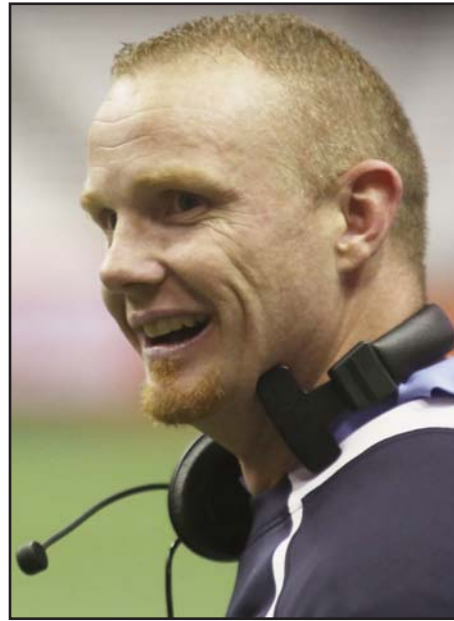

time I took over as head coach, we had already won 2 Section 10 titles.”

The Warriors would win Section 10 championships in 2006, 2007 and 2008. They made the New York State semifinals in 2006.

“We were 50-0 in Section 10,” Marsell said. “Our program was healthy and we wanted to play more Class A schools so it was time to move back.”

Indian River returned to the Syracuse-based Section 3 with the in 2009 but, until this season, the Warriors had not won a title.

“We’ve been very successful,” Marsell said, “but we had never gotten over the hump.”

And now, with help from the smallest player in the game, the Warriors have gotten over a big hump.

Indian River finished the season 13-0. It’s the first championship for any Section III team since West Genesee (Class AA) and Bishop Ludden (Class C) won titles in 2007.

NEW YORK STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

at Syracuse University

Class AA: Jamestown 41, Newburgh Free 20

Jamestown surrendered a pair of field goals in the first quarter but led 14-6 as the Red Raiders beat Newburgh Free Academy for the Class AA title.

Newburgh scored first on a 25-yard field goal by Peter Matthews but Jamestown answered.

With just over 4 minutes remaining in the opening quarter, Jamestown drove 60 yards on 7 plays in just :34 for a TD. Devan Jackson capped the drive when he scored on a 7-yard run and a 7-3 lead.

Jackson stayed on the field for the kickoff and made a huge play. As Newburgh's kick returner struggled for yards, Jackson ripped the ball out of his hands and ran 44 yards for another TD.

Matthews kicked another FG, this time from 28 yards, to pull Newburgh within 14-6.

Nikk Holland scored on a pair of short TDs and Jamestown led 28-13 at the half.

Early in the fourth quarter, Holland bolted 98 yards for a TD, giving Jamestown a commanding 34-13 lead.

Holland finished the day with 138 yards on 15 carries. He completed 11 of 21 passes for 246 yards and a TD.

Zach Panebianco caught 6 passes for 125 yards, including a 22-yard TD in the 4th quarter. Panebianco also returned a punt 67 yards to set up a score, intercepted a pass, and was 5-of-6 on PAT kicks. He was named the game's MVP.

Stephen Carlson caught 4 passes for 107 yards. He also made 9 tackles on defense.

Newburgh's Anthony Dubose rushed 21 times for 259 yards, including a 41-yard TD.

Kyle Liuzzo led the Raiders defense as he made 12 tackles. He also recorded 3 tackles-for-loss, including 2 QB sacks. In all, the Raiders made 9 tackles-for-loss.

It was Jamestown's first NYS title since 2000. The Red Raiders also won back-to-back titles in 1994 and 1995.

The Red Raiders finished 11-1, losing only to Canisius, the state's top-ranked Class AA team.

Class B: Maine-Endwell 27, Schalmont 19

Maine-Endwell raced to a 21-0 halftime lead and beat Schalmont 27-19 to win the school's fourth consecutive NYS title.

The Spartans won the Class A title in 2011 and won the Class B title for the past three seasons. It was the second straight year that Maine-Endwell has beaten Schalmont in the Carrier Dome.

Halfway through the first quarter, Maine-Endwell's Adam Gallagher intercepted a pass and returned it 25 yards for a TD and a 7-0 lead.

In the last minute of the opening frame, Kyle Balmer hit Michael Palmer with a 35-yard TD pass and a 14-0 lead. Balmer completed 3 of 6 passes for 47 yards on the day.

Late in the first half, Maine-Endwell started a drive near midfield. The Spartans drove 47 yards on 11 plays to score before the break. Gallagher powered into the end zone from 5 yards out with just :16 left in the half.

Midway through the 3rd quarter it appeared as if

Schalmont was going to mount a rally. The Sabres had driven to the Maine-Endwell 5-yard line and faced a first-and-goal.

The exchange from center was bobbled. Gallagher picked the ball out of mid-air and raced untouched 95 yards for a TD and a 27-0 lead.

The Sabres faced an uphill climb after that but they did manage to score 3 TDs. Nick Gallo, who rushed for 113 yards on the day, got Schalmont on the board with a 5-yard run.

With :14 left in the game, Schalmont scored on a 36-yard tipped pass from Dalton Cooke to Devin Higgins and the Sabres trailed by 8. Maine-Endwell recovered the onside kick to clinch the win.

Cordell Woolfolk led Maine-Endwell with 71 rushing yards on 16 carries. Gallagher finished with 47 yards and a TD.

Maine-Endwell has now won 51 straight games, tied (Hornell) for the longest winning streak in NYS History.

at Syracuse University

Class C: Chenango Forks 20, Hoosick Falls 14

Chenango Forks rushed for 326 yards and beat Hoosick Falls 20-14 in the Class C title game. It was the second consecutive NYS title for the Blue Devils.

Chenango Forks had to rally from behind twice to pull out the win. The Blue Devils also lost 4 fumbles in the game.

Hoosick Falls took advantage of a fumble that they recovered at the Forks 22-yard line. It took the Panthers 7 plays to score as Austin Pitt punched in a 1-yard TD.

Chenango took the ensuing possession at their own 20 and proceeded to march 80 yards in 15 plays to score. The drive took 5:34, capped by Ryan Bronson who ran 4 yards for a TD. The PAT failed and Forks still trailed 7-6.

The Blue Devils took their first lead with 3:55 left in the half. Tim McDonald ran 24 yards for a TD to finish a 63-yard drive.

The 2-point PAT pass fell incomplete, leaving the score at 12-7.

Hoosick Valley responded immediately as the Panthers drove 68 yards to take the lead.

Garrett Wright ran in from 4 yards out. Damon Dubois kicked the PAT and Hoosick Falls led 14-12 at the half.

The defenses battled in the third quarter and into the fourth.

With 9 minutes left, Chenango Forks forced a punt and took possession on their own 19. The Blue Devils battered their way over the midfield line. On the 8th play of the drive, Bronson broke free for a 42-yard TD to give Chenango a 20-14 lead.

The defense held the rest of the way.

But the Cardinals put on a furious rally in the third quarter to climb back into the game. Randolph QB Bryce Morrison ran for 2 TDs, including a 44-yarder, to pull the Cardinals within 27-21. With 4:25 left in the third quarter Devyn Nelsen raced 25 yards for a TD. Joe Andrews kicked the PAT and the Cardinals had their first lead, 28-27.

The Cardinals scored once more before the 3rd quarter ended. Morrison capped a 69-yard drive with an 8-yard TD run to give Randolph a 34-27 lead.

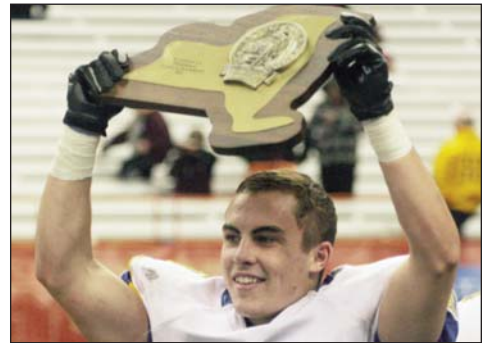

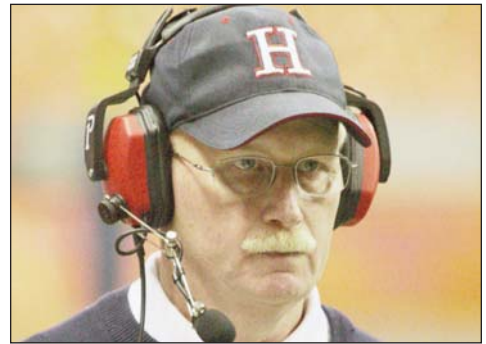
